Welcome to the spirit of the world!

Alchemy 2015 brings a magical mix of feature films, short film screenings and artists' installations featuring filmmakers and moving image artists from around the globe.

Our fifth edition aims to explore the Spiritus Mundi, a historical term for the World Soul, relating to a spirit of universality, internationalism and underlying unity.

As much a provocation as a theme, the Spiritus Mundi is something ineffable, always more hidden than revealed, glimpsed only in the traces it leaves. This characteristic is something that goes to the heart of many of the works presented this year.

What motive forces stir beneath the surface of things, beneath and beyond the image itself, behind the camera, inside ourselves as we watch? Film in this sense is only ever a reflection of something hidden from sight, something other.

The Spiritus Mundi, we might hope, may further manifest itself in the vitality of the lived present we find ourselves in, those moments of connectivity, exchange and revelation that only a festival of this kind can bring.

We are especially delighted to be welcoming over 60 artists from around the world. More than ever before, people are travelling far and wide, helping to make Alchemy the unique happening it is. The festival starts with an Artists' Filmmaking Symposium with talks from a range of leading industry speakers, followed by the opening of our ten Moving Image Installations in venues around the town.

A special woollen mill screening of French artist Jacques Perconte's new film, Ettrick, made here in the Scottish Borders, is on Thursday night. We have four quest curated short film programmes, Disintegrating Bodies, Transmutations, A Waste Land, and films from the Swedenborg Film Festival. Our special features include Lech Majewski's hauntingly beautiful Field of Dogs (Poland), a mini-retrospective of the work of the light artist and filmmaker Joost Rekveld (Netherlands), and a focus on the avant-garde filmmaker Paul Sharits, in a new documentary feature by François Miron (Canada). Filmmakers from the UK include Sarah Pucill with her kaleidoscopic surrealist film Magic Mirror and an unmissable 16mm Live Cinema performance by Guy Sherwin & Lynn Loo. It also gives us great joy this year to be hosting a Community Screening of films made by local participants in our Scottish Borders Community Filmmaking Initiative.

Our main auditorium offers a full programme of short film and feature screenings from 10am every day, while our Screening Room offers a second full-time screening strand, showing a programme of specially selected films continuously throughout the festival.

We look forward to extending a warm welcome to our audiences and filmmakers from across Scotland, the UK, Europe, the USA and beyond.

FILM SYMPOSIUM - TALKS

2.00pm Andrew Kötting: Moving Image, Trace Elements and Noise Spillage (How sound has always been the motor for my picture)

The work I make has always been very dependent on sound. Noise is half the picture. A trawl back through some of my practice will reveal that despite the various outcomes sound is always at the heart of the matter. Driven by a strong desire to dig into autobiography and its psyche, I will also expand on how the work meanders between the gallery space, the cinematic space and the performance space. There seems to be an ever increasing pressure to explain, contextualise, theorise and over dramatise every piece of work that one makes. But it is the investigation of vague notions that sticks.



2.35pm Kim Knowles: Questioning the 'why': can we learn to stop worrying and love film?

In Q&A after Q&A I have encountered filmmakers being asked why they have chosen to make their work on film rather than on video. For some, this is not even a conscious decision – their language is a language of film, like a musician who chooses the clarinet rather than the trumpet. For others, film is a statement, a 'fuck you to contemporary fads' as the artist Bradley Eros so beautifully put it. But why is the why so important? This talk will explore the continued and growing use of celluloid film among artists and will challenge the film-digital polarisation that characterises many discussions about contemporary practice.



3.10pm Isla Leaver-Yap: Supporting artists' moving image production

Isla Leaver-Yap will discuss the intersectional nature of supporting artists' moving image production and display, both from the perspective of her role as Project Director of LUX Scotland, and as the Bentson Film Scholar for the Walker Arts Center's Film and Video Department in Minneapolis.



4.05pm Peter Taylor: Choosing the In-Between – curating film and artists' moving image

The best filmmakers push beyond normative constraints of format, duration, representation and genre, opening a new terrain in which to flex our intellectual and emotional muscles. Cinema provides a site for asking new questions of ourselves and each another, our perceptions and memories. It is a space where we let ourselves unravel in the dark. An elusive and awkward magic happens, connecting us and transcending highly regulated viewing conditions. This potential of cinema to stimulate different ways of thinking and new ways of seeing excites me, and these are moments I hope to assist in creating in my role as a curator.



4.40pm Claudia Yusef: What we talk about when we talk about film

What does experimental or artists' film have to do with narrative drama filmmaking? How do we distinguish one from the other, and how do people make the transition from one to the other, if they even want to? Claudia Yusef, of the Scottish Film Talent Network, will talk about the intersection between experimental film and the film industry.

Join us on a guided tour of our moving image installations around the town of Hawick, our participating artists will be on hand to introduce each one.

Alice Betts' And the Walls Became the World Around presents a sculptural installation using paper and projection to explore the significance of nature in memory and personal narrative. Andrew Kötting's By Our Selves follows in the footsteps of the poet John Clare and features Toby Jones. lain Sinclair and Andrew Kötting himself, dressed as a Straw Bear. The three-screen installation Mother, I Am Going, by Caitlin and Andrew Webb-Ellis, uses documentary, performance and archive footage to explore the fragmentary quality of memory. Narda Azaria Dalgleish's On Being Yes-ed Upon is a dramatic six-projector installation directly inspired by the festival's theme, the Spiritus Mundi. Leiden Translations by Alistair Zaldua & Adam Hodgkins explores categories of translation for the 3rd century Leiden papyrus. In *Parallel Botanies*, the Japanese born artist Shunsaku Hiyashi presents us with a rigorous and uncompromising portrayal of disused chimneys, questioning our reading of function and form within notions of self-identity. Lin Li's Prelude Perhaps Postscript invokes submerged imagery to interrogate transitional psychological states within the locus of our own distinct 'borderland'. John Woodman's quiet and penetratingly observed two screen installation, Ruskin's Ponds, draws

us into a durational experience of reflexive deep seeing. In *The Books of Waiting* by **Livia Daza Paris**, self-portraits and journal entries are projected onto oversize books, exploring the disappearance of records of political repression in Venezuala in the 1970s. **Sarahjane Swan & Roger Simian** take W.B Yeats' apocalyptic vision of a beast arising out of the Spiritus Mundi as their starting point for an evolving installation with sporadic performances. *Time Just Is*, by **Sean Harris**, presents a re-animated rendering of the Swimming Reindeer, the oldest paleolithic sculpture in the British Museum. In **Brenda Miller's** quietly intimate *Thinking Stitch*, women work together with textiles, reflecting our own industrial heritage in the Scottish Borders, and celebrating the personal value of shared experience. *Caravan Obscura* uses lenses and mirrors to project the outside inside, and visitors can try on an 'upside down' viewing box to experience the world inverted.

A special world premiere to be screened at Johnstons of Elgin woollen mill. Made over the course of several visits to the Scottish Borders by the French artist filmmaker Jacques Perconte, the film interrogates our unique heritage: sheep farming, fabrics, the woollen mill tradition and our unique landscapes are all rendered in an impressionistic arc of colour and movement. The path we drive leads to the heart of the Ettrick Forest, a dive into a textile world. A land where man, machinery and nature deal with a complex relationship that draws their future. Slipping through poetry, between the brutality of matter and the sublime landscape, we experience a penetrating vision that embodies the stability of our deep desire to live in peace. Spectators are aware of the impotence of our movements, and we know that nature will find its way.

10.00am – 11.15am **DISINTEGRATING BODIES**

A programme of films exploring the relationship between the body, technology and the materials of reproduction. The films presented here focus in different ways on the unstable and disintegrating body, its relationship to the environment, and also to those technologies that represent and contain it. From the gradually disintegrating faces in **van Ingen's** VHS loop of *The Fly* to the visible traces of biochemical decay on **Bourque's** buried film of her younger self, these works ask us to reflect on questions of aging, death, trauma, waste and decay in an increasingly mediated and mediatized society. Ritual plays an important role here, as does the physical struggle with materials and matter. The filmmaker as an alchemist of sorts uses these corporeal transformations as a means to reflect on the contemporary anxieties of the body in flux.

The three medium length films in this programme all explore distinct localities, interwoven with differing visions of utopian space. In Headlands Lookout, a protagonist of indeterminate status traverses an area of Pacific coastline, touching on military defences, the natural environment, and the abandoned counter-culture community of Druid Heights, once home to Zen philosopher Alan Watts. Gente Perra (Dog people) transports us to a distant imagined future, a magico-realist rendering of colonial testaments, gnomes, and a destructive guest for the essential, mythical 'sweet milk'. Atlantis might at first seem like a documentary of place, yet gently it moves us into an uncertain utopian territory of shimmering water, folk custom and pagan rites, drawing on another Atlantis – the 1970's sci-fi novel of the same name.

PAUL SHARITS: A DOCUMENTARY FEATURE FILM

François Miron / Canada / 2015 / 1h 25m / UK Premiere

Long after his premature death, the impact of Paul Sharits lingers on. The prominent iconoclast and innovator provoked with fast-flickering, pulsating, colourful mosaics. This film is also a portrait of a generation of the leading voices in experimental filmmaking. In the mid sixties Paul Sharits (1943-1993) explored the potential of flicker, going on to pursue the total deconstruction of the parameters of 16mm film into such novel forms as multiple projection installations, frozen film frames caught in-between plexiglass sheets, and ink coloured partitions for abstract films. Miron's documentary offers a great recapitulation of one of the most idiosyncratic and pertinent oeuvres within avant-garde film history. It is also a portrait of a tormented, deeply romantic artist, always courting disaster and cursed by an inherited mental condition.

This screening will be accompanied by a special showing of one of Paul Sharits' seminal works on 16mm film: *T.O.U.C.H.I.N.G* (USA, 1968, 12m).

It features a diverse selection of film artworks, chosen for their alignment with poetry, with poetry structures, with poetic experiences, and with the visual, verbal and aural languages of poetry in various forms.

PoetryFilm is a research art project founded by Zata Kitowski in 2002, celebrating and exploring poetry films and other text/ image/sound material. Since 2002, PoetryFilm has presented over 60 events at venues including Tate Britain, The ICA, FACT Liverpool, Cannes Film Festival, CCCB Barcelona, O Miami, The Royal College of Art and Curzon Cinemas.





LIGHT MATTERS: #11, MAREY <-> MOIRÉ & #37

Joost Rekveld / Netherlands / 1999 & 2009 / 1h 10m / Scottish Premiere

* Joost Rekveld will be present for a Q&A at the screening.

Dedicated to the film-work of Joost Rekveld, presenting newly digitised versions of two of his most famous 35mm films, #11, Marev <-> Moiré (21m) and #37 (31m). Through his unique practice of luminous poiesis, Joost Rekveld creates films filled with structured light abstractions, at times invoking an almost transcendental experience in the viewer. Yet his work is substantively concerned with the material and sensual properties of light: its symmetries, crystalline forms, diffractions and diffusions. These possibilities emerge out of a controlled interaction between light, man and machine, a dialogue at the heart of his practice. Using computer controlled optical-mechanical devices for the distribution and perversion of light across the filmstrip, or custom coded computer simulations of crystal diffraction patterns, his work often refers to the deep technological history of film and media practice.

Guy Sherwin & Lynn Loo / UK / 2015 / 1h / Scottish Premiere

Guy Sherwin & Lynn Loo have been collaborating on performances of live cinema since 2005. They explore projection as live event using several projectors, often shifting image size, focus or position during projection. Hand-made and photographed optical sounds (on film) are also mixed live during performance. Sometimes they collaborate with musicians to perform their works – and overall the direction of the work is to bring live 16mm film closer to the condition of music, with its ease of performance and connection between players. Their performances create a clear distinction from the smooth predictability of DV projection and embrace film as material and projection as process – with all the glitchy images and sounds that film produces – the rough edges, the mechanical irregularities, the flare outs.







Magic Mirror combines a re-staging of the French Surrealist artist Claude Cahun's black and white photographs with selected extracts from her book Aveux Non Avenus (Confessions Denied). In Surrealist kaleidoscopic fashion the film creates a weave between image and word, exploring the links between Cahun's photographs and writing as well as between those of the films of Sarah Pucill, as both artists share similar iconography and concerns. Cahun's multi-subjectivity as expressed in both her book and photographs, set the scene for the film, where she dresses and makes her face up in so many different ways, swapping identities between gender, age and the inanimate. Three women masquerade as Cahun's characters: often it is hard to tell them apart.

Lech Majewski's remarkable *Field of Dogs* is a sumptuously shot exploration of loss and spiritual redemption. The film shimmers in a richly imagistic yet uncertain territory between imagination and reality. Set in 2010, when the Polish people lost their president Lech Kaczynski in a plane crash that killed all 96 people on board. This context of national tragedy is mirrored in the personal tragedy of loss experienced by a former professor, who enters into a dark and hallucinatory journey toward a rediscovery of light and meaning. Stunningly rendered visual set-pieces punctuate the film, at times referencing the great paintings upon which Majewski so often draws. His father ploughs up the floor of a supermarket with oxen, people in evening dress stand still in a lit wood at night, a liminal vision of purgatory, great sheets of water flood through a cathedral. Majewski is not afraid to tackle the big themes of life and death with bold visual ambition and deep commitment, bringing to film his own sense of humanity and a personal rendering of the spirituality of the Polish psyche.
