Trustees' Report

The trustees present the annual report together with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 30 June 2019.

Objectives and activities

Objects and aims

The principal objects of the company are:-

- (a) To champion the development of the arts, predominantly but not exclusively, in the Scottish Borders and beyond. We aim to encourage the people of the Scottish Borders, in particular its young people, visitors to the region and its creative residents in high quality arts experiences, thus generating creative, cultural and economic benefit for the region. We aim to stimulate local talent, social and community cohesion, and engage people with the unique Borders landscape and heritage, thus enriching their quality of life, and in furtherance of those objects.
- (b) To advance the arts, heritage, culture and science in the Scottish Borders, predominantly but not exclusively, particularly by the practice, knowledge, understanding and appreciation of visual arts, music, literature, performance, film and craft (herein after known as the arts) and not excluding other art forms as may be relevant.
- (c) To advance education through the arts and to promote, maintain and improve education through the arts.
- (d) To promote equality and diversity through the arts, and to increase the accessibility of the arts to the public throughout the region by providing facilities for the presentation and practice of the arts.
- (e) Any other purpose that may reasonably be regarded as analogous to any of the preceding purposes.

Use of volunteers

The directors wish to record their appreciation of the time and efforts contributed by volunteer helpers who have worked extremely hard to ensure that the events have proceeded.

Trustees' Report

Achievements and performance

"Everything changes and nothing stands still" Heraclitus, Greek philosopher, a very long time ago.

Change is the only constant in life and here at Alchemy Film and Arts, 2018 - 2019 was indeed the year that everything changed and nothing stood still.

In late 2018 our Creative Director and Founder Dr. Richard Ashrowan, moved on from Alchemy after more than 9 years at the helm. His astonishing legacy - and the outcome of his many years of commitment, passion and sheer graft - is an organisation that not only delivers an annual internationally renowned Film Festival in Hawick and supports the best of experimental filmmaking, but is more and more engaged with our local community.

Our Chair, Keith Alexander, who had been at Richard's side from the earliest days of Alchemy, also decided to enjoy more of his retirement and we are very grateful for his steady hand, steering us through our transition period before stepping down in May 2019. Our new Creative Director, Michael Pattinson, was already a friend to Alchemy and part of our programming team when he took over from Richard Ashrowan to deliver the 2019 edition of Alchemy Film and Moving Image Festival. The ninth edition the festival presented 147 moving-image works in Hawick over 5 days, across 8 programme strands, in more than 10 venues, clocking up over 6400 event visits, breaking Alchemy records.

Michael brings an understanding of and a capacity to articulate the meaning, impact and importance of experimental film that leaves us in no doubt that our reputation for bravery, quality and inclusivity will remain intact. His first and our ninth festival, amongst other things, introduced a new logo and tagline of "Embrace the Strange" – a tongue-in-cheek dare to newcomers to experimental film.

Our Programme Manager, Rachael Disbury joined us in 2018 through our funding as an RFO with Creative Scotland. Rachael is hugely experienced and skilled in all areas of arts and culture management from her previous role at Deveron Projects in Huntly. We are very lucky to have someone in post with her organisational skills, capacity for strategic thinking and personal drive. Our latest news is that she has just recently moved into a Production Director position with us, taking on a joint management overview of Alchemy with Michael.

We are now through our first year of RFO funding and are pleased to have been able to introduce our expanded programme, revise our website, improve our financial management systems and develop more robust policies including an Equality, Diversity and Inclusion Action Plan.

Our Exhibition Programme this year was curated via open call submissions — open to everyone. The final artists, selected on merit, were all female artists at varying points in their careers. 115 volunteers were involved in this Exhibition Programme, and a further 915 people attended the showcases. One of the exhibitions was a specially commissioned new artwork by emerging artist Rhona Mühlebach, made in Hawick, with local contribution and engaging with local themes.

We have looked outwards to build relationships, partner, work with and support other organisations in the film-making world this year. We curated two programmes for the Glasgow Film Festival and we were on the selection panel for Cove Park's Moving Image Residency. We were also involved in Margaret Tait 100 celebrations which featured in our festival via a commissioned poem, a talk, a screening and a film walk. And I'm very pleased to say that we continue to work with our Borders Moving Image Makers Collective who launched their self-curated "On the Move" touring programme, with our support.

Moving further afield, eight artists travelled to Morocco to take part in our residencies and we were pleased to present four of the resulting films and an installation at this year's festival. This is one example of the many ways that we are working to bring together all of the strands of what we do and present them through the lens of our Alchemy identity.

Towards the end of the 2018-2019 cycle, we engaged Tom Swift as our Film Town Coordinator. His role is to develop and deliver community based workshops and we have been very impressed by his energy and ability to engage with, and inspire, a diverse range of people.

Trustees' Report

A year of fundraising has meant we can sustain our Film Town community filmmaking project into next year and reach out to help build skills and confidence across a range of groups who may otherwise never consider the skills and experiences film opportunities could encourage. As well as involving our community in film-making, these projects will help build our volunteer pool from within the Hawick community. Our many long term and new volunteers have continued to support us through all our strands of delivery – we can't thank them enough and know that we would be a very different and lesser beast without them.

And finally, I write as the newly appointed Chair of the Alchemy Board. A Trustee since August 2017, I am so proud to be part of this team and I feel privileged to be part of creating Alchemy's future as we head towards our 10-year anniversary in 2020. We will be finding ways to look back and celebrate our history and we look forward to an equally exciting next 10 years!

Financial review

Policy on reserves

A small amount of unrestricted funds are maintained to meet the running costs of the charity. The reserves policy will be reviewed as time progresses.

Principal funding sources

The principal funding has been from grants and donations as well as ticket and merchandising sales.

Plans for future periods

Aims and key objectives for future periods

We are now entering year 2 of RFO Creative Scotland funding, during which time we will start to look towards further stability and strategic programming, and the beginnings of a business plan that will satisfy a 2021-2024 RFO bid.

Going concern

The trustees consider that the charity is a going concern.

Structure, governance and management

Nature of governing document

The company was a company limited by guarantee and was set up by a Memorandum of Association on 17 June 2013. On the 4 August 2017 the company converted to a SCIO, a Scottish Charitable Incorporated Organisation, governed by a revised constitution.

Recruitment and appointment of trustees

The management of the organisation is the responsibility of the Trustees who are elected and co-opted under the terms of the new constitution.

Arrangements for setting key management personnel remuneration

Trustees are not remunerated for their services.

Organisational structure

The trustees meet on a bi-monthly basis to discuss the charity's affairs. All trustees participate in the decision-making process.

Financial instruments

Objectives and policies

The charity's activities expose it to a number of financial risks including credit risk, cash flow risk and liquidity risk. The use of financial derivatives is governed by the charity's policies approved by the board of trustees, which provide written principles on the use of financial derivatives to manage these risks. The charity does not use derivative financial instruments for speculative purposes.

Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 30 June 2019

1 Accounting policies

Statement of compliance

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015) - (Charities SORP (FRS 102)), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006.

Basis of preparation

Alchemy Film and Arts meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy notes.

The accounts have been prepared in sterling and are rounded to the nearest £1.

Exemption from preparing a cash flow statement

The charity opted to early adopt Bulletin 1 published on 2 February 2016 and have therefore not included a cash flow statement in these financial statements.

Going concern

The trustees consider that there are no material uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue as a going concern.

Income and endowments

Voluntary income including donations, gifts, legacies and grants that provide core funding or are of a general nature is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the income, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured with sufficient reliability.

Donations and legacies

Donations and legacies are recognised on a receivable basis when receipt is probable and the amount can be reliably measured.

Grants receivable

Grants are recognised when the charity has an entitlement to the funds and any conditions linked to the grants have been met. Where performance conditions are attached to the grant and are yet to be met, the income is recognised as a liability and included on the balance sheet as deferred income to be released.

Expenditure

All expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to that expenditure, it is probable settlement is required and the amount can be measured reliably. All costs are allocated to the applicable expenditure heading that aggregate similar costs to that category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated on a basis consistent with the use of resources, with central staff costs allocated on the basis of time spent, and depreciation charges allocated on the portion of the asset's use. Other support costs are allocated based on the spread of staff costs.

Charitable activities

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.

Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 30 June 2019

Support costs

Support costs include central functions and have been allocated to activity cost categories on a basis consistent with the use of resources, for example, allocating property costs by floor areas, or per capita, staff costs by the time spent and other costs by their usage.

Governance costs

These include the costs attributable to the charity's compliance with constitutional and statutory requirements, including audit, strategic management and trustees's meetings and reimbursed expenses.

Government grants

Government grants are recognised based on the accrual model and are measured at the fair value of the asset received or receivable. Grants are classified as relating either to revenue or to assets. Grants relating to revenue are recognised in income over the period in which the related costs are recognised. Grants relating to assets are recognised over the expected useful life of the asset. Where part of a grant relating to an asset is deferred, it is recognised as deferred income.

Taxation

The charity is considered to pass the tests set out in Paragraph 1 Schedule 6 of the Finance Act 2010 and therefore it meets the definition of a charitable company for UK corporation tax purposes. Accordingly, the charity is potentially exempt from taxation in respect of income or capital gains received within categories covered by Chapter 3 Part 11 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010 or Section 256 of the Taxation of Chargeable Gains Act 1992, to the extent that such income or gains are applied exclusively to charitable purposes.

Trade debtors

Trade debtors are amounts due from customers for merchandise sold or services performed in the ordinary course of business.

Trade debtors are recognised initially at the transaction price. They are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less provision for impairment. A provision for the impairment of trade debtors is established when there is objective evidence that the charity will not be able to collect all amounts due according to the original terms of the receivables.

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash on hand and call deposits, and other short-term highly liquid investments that are readily convertible to a known amount of cash and are subject to an insignificant risk of change in value.

Trade creditors

are obligations to pay for goods or services that have been acquired in the ordinary course of business from suppliers. Accounts payable are classified as current liabilities if the does not have an unconditional right, at the end of the reporting period, to defer settlement of the creditor for at least twelve months after the reporting date. If there is an unconditional right to defer settlement for at least twelve months after the reporting date, they are presented as non-current liabilities.

are recognised initially at the transaction price and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

Fund structure

Unrestricted income funds are general funds that are available for use at the trustees's discretion in furtherance of the objectives of the charity.

Restricted income funds are those donated for use in a particular area or for specific purposes, the use of which is restricted to that area or purpose.

Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 30 June 2019

Financial instruments

Classification

Financial assets and financial liabilities are recognised when the charity becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Financial liabilities and equity instruments are classified according to the substance of the contractual arrangements entered into. An equity instrument is any contract that evidences a residual interest in the assets of the charity after deducting all of its liabilities.

Recognition and measurement

All financial assets and liabilities are initially measured at transaction price (including transaction costs), except for those financial assets classified as at fair value through profit or loss, which are initially measured at fair value (which is normally the transaction price excluding transaction costs), unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction. If an arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, the financial asset or financial liability is measured at the present value of the future payments discounted at a market rate of interest for a similar debt instrument.

Financial assets and liabilities are only offset in the statement of financial position when, and only when there exists a legally enforceable right to set off the recognised amounts and the charity intends either to settle on a net basis, or to realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

Financial assets are derecognised when and only when a) the contractual rights to the cash flows from the financial asset expire or are settled, b) the charity transfers to another party substantially all of the risks and rewards of ownership of the financial asset, or c) the charity, despite having retained some, but not all, significant risks and rewards of ownership, has transferred control of the asset to another party.

Financial liabilities are derecognised only when the obligation specified in the contract is discharged, cancelled or expires.

Derivative financial instruments

The charity uses derivative financial instruments to reduce exposure to foreign exchange risk and interest rate movements. The charity does not hold or issue derivative financial instruments for speculative purposes.

Derivatives are initially recognised at fair value at the date a derivative contract is entered into and are subsequently remeasured to their fair value at each reporting date. The resulting gain or loss is recognised in statement of financial activities immediately unless the derivative is designated and effective as a hedging instrument, in which event the timing of the recognition in statement of financial activities depends on the nature of the hedge relationship.

Fair value measurement

The best evidence of fair value is a quoted price for an identical asset in an active market. When quoted prices are unavailable, the price of a recent transaction for an identical asset provides evidence of fair value as long as there has not been a significant change in economic circumstances or a significant lapse of time since the transaction took place. If the market is not active and recent transactions of an identical asset on their own are not a good estimate of fair value, the fair value is estimated by using a valuation technique.
